Architectural style

One of the largest Loew's theatres ever built in the Bronx, offered as a rare historical renovation opportunity for New York City, a not-for-profit preservation organization, or a distinctive home for an educational facility. The ground floor is currently occupied by a Fine Fare Supermarket; the historic auditorium survives above and behind, largely intact.

Opened on September 12, 1928, the Loew's Fairmount was among the largest of the Loew's houses in the Bronx — 2,559 seats beneath a semi-Atmospheric ceiling of deep blue sky, framed by Joseph Orlando's French Renaissance plasterwork and voiced by a three-manual, nineteen-rank Robert-Morton organ. The theatre presented vaudeville and film for three decades, later served as a Hispanic cultural center and museum, and closed after a final run as the triplex Fairmount Cinemas in February 1991. Much of the original auditorium survives, offering a rare canvas for restoration — as a performance venue, a cultural institution, or a singular educational facility in the heart of the Bronx.
